



Castles



Key facts:

- A castle is a strong building that was often the home of a king or lord in medieval times and afterward.
- Castles were built in many places, including Japan, India, and other countries.
- The leader's fortress was often built on a high mound encircled by a ditch and topped with a stronghold.
- The current British monarch is King Charles III
- At the Battle of Hastings, William, duke of Normandy, defeated King Harold II to win the English throne. The battle took place on 14th October 1066.

Magna Carta: was a document that gave certain rights to the English people. It stated that everyone, even the King must obey the law.

Bayeux Tapestry: an embroidered 70-meter-long cloth depicting the events leading up to the Battle of Hastings in 1066.

Learning Journey—

Through this history topic pupils will learn that England has been ruled by Kings and Queens for many years and will learn to sequence some key rulers. Pupils will use historical sources such as the Bayeux Tapestry to find out about key events in history such as the Battle of Hastings and will learn about significant turning points such as the signing of the Magna Carta by King John.

Pupils will develop historical enquiry skills and be asked to make inferences and explain their thinking. They will explore medieval artefacts, compare images and consider changes through time. The children will learn about the features of the first castles and why they were important for Norman invaders. They will find out about the people who lived in castles and the different jobs they had and how castles have changed through time.
