



Amazing Africa



Key facts:

- Africa is the second largest continent in size and the second largest continent in population.
- There are 54 countries in Africa, all with their own cultures and languages.
- There are as many as 2000 languages spoken in Africa.
- Nelson Mandela was a civil rights leader in South Africa.
- He fought against apartheid- a system where people of colour did not have the same rights.

Continent: A continent is a large solid area of land. In order from largest to smallest they are Asia, Africa, North and South America, Antarctica, Europe and Australasia.

Learning Journey—The children will be exploring the countries in the continent Africa and investigate the significant historical changes in Africa.

The children will begin by exploring the world's continents and oceans and will be able to identify Africa and some of the countries within Africa. We will also learn about the location of hot and cold countries in relation to the equator. We will investigate what life is like in different countries in Africa to begin to form simple comparisons between the different places. We will explore some of the key features of a village in Africa and will be able to use geographical language to describe human and physical features in comparison to where we live.

Following on from a geography focus we will then explore how Africa's history has changed through time. We will begin by investigating how significant Nelson Mandela has been to Africa and sequence the events of his life chronologically. We will also look more closely at the importance of the abolishment of the apartheid and develop the children's empathy and understanding.
