Activity 1: Think about each of the characters in the picture. What do you think they can feel, see and hear? Read up to page 19-20. Why do you think the mother and son are planting a tree? What do you imagine has happened to the father? Activity 2: Use BBC resources to learn about the features of writing a diary entry. While modern diary entries use informal language, formal language was used more frequently in the time period of WW1. You should use formal language in your work. Activity 3: Write a diary entry in role as either the son or the mother, on the day they received news of the father's death. Challenge: Use your historical knowledge to help you write an entry that is accurate to the time setting, e.g. letters were used to communicate rather than phones or email, formal language was more common.	Spag focus - features of direct speech. Follow the lesson presentation and complete learning activities. Activity 1: Practise writing some sentences the father and son might have said to each other on the day they spent at the beach. Use the features of direct speech. Use BBC link to remind yourself of how we write direct speech. Activity 2: Borrow a family member to be your talk partner. You will each take on the role of one of the family members on the morning before the father left for war. What would you want to say to each other? How would you act? Activity 3: Write your scene based on your imagined conversation between two of the characters. Remember to also include description and action, not just speech. Remember to include all the features of direct speech. Challenge: Try to use the kind of formal language that would have been common during WW1.	Spag starter- phrases and clauses. Follow the lesson presentation and complete learning activities. Activity 1: Ink waster- think of as many words as possible you could use instead of 'said' in one minute. Use these to help you when writing dialogue. Activity 2: Read the two descriptions given in the lesson presentation. Which is better? The second example is more subtle- the writer is using a technique called show don't tell. The description is mixed in with the story and dialogue so you hardly notice it. Activity 3: Your task is to write a description of one of the characters in a subtle way. You should tell us all about the character, such as appearance and personality. Challenge: Use action and dialogue as a way to give your reader more information about the character.
