## Reporting the use of the Pupil Premium Kimbolton Primary Academy 2017 to 2018

Overview	The Pupil Premium is designed to ensure that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most. The funding is allocated to Local Authorities and schools with pupils from Reception to Year 11 who are eligible for free school meals (FSM), who are looked after or have parents currently in the Armed Forces.  From 2012, the coverage of the Premium was widened to include those eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years.  In 2017/18 pupil premium was £1320 per pupil.

Statement about the effect of the expenditure on the educational attainment of those pupils who were eligible for pupil premium.

There were no children qualifying for the pupil premium payment in Year 2 or Year 6 last year. 100% of children qualifying in EYFS achieved a good level of development, 100% of children in Year 1 achieved age-related levels in reading, writing and maths. Children in other year groups generally made good progress unless their circumstances were exceptional and made more complex by other barriers to learning.

Attendance for children who qualified for pupil premium funding was 93.88% which is only slightly lower than the school as a whole. The attendance of one child who had been a persistent absentee at his previous school continues to rise – 88.2% this year compared to 87.4% in 2015-2016. We continue to support the family with a CAF/EHA.
