In today's lesson we are looking at estimating and measuring lengths. We will be looking at both metric and non-metric units of measure. Go outside and using either chalk or objects, measure different lengths using non-metric measurements. Estimate your length, and then using a metre stick or tape, check your estimation. Then can you state the distance in metres?	For this lesson you will need paper, a pencil, and a ruler. Look at the worksheet attached. Using a ruler, can you accurately measure the lines. They will need to be measured to the mm. Can you order the lines?	Look around your house and select different objects. Estimate the length of each object, and then measure using non-metric and metric units. Make sure you are measuring to the nearest cm and mm.	Activity two: Is there a relation between your arm length and the length of your leg? Measuring and seeing if there is a pattern.	
	Extension: What would happen if we didn't have a straight line? How could we measure this accurately?	Record your findings in a simple table format. Make sure you work out the difference between your estimation and the actual length.	Activity three: How many bricks would be needed to build a length wall of 3m?
